CHAIR'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the fourth Chairman's report on behalf of the board of Fraser Park Sportsville Inc. (FPS)

I said in my report from last year, my first as board Chair, that *'we still have some considerable way to travel until our future looks a little more secure but together, we can make FPS the place that we all want it'*. In the last twelve months we have indeed progressed in a significant way and the sense of teamwork from board, staff, member clubs and key stakeholders such as Hutt City Council (HCC) and the Community Facilities Trust (CFT) has helped to set us in the right direction. For this sense of teamwork, we are all most grateful.

Just over twelve months ago the FPS Working Party report was presented to HCC with a strong recommendation that the Sportsville model was not broken but needed more financial support and more time to find its feet. The Working Party consisting of representatives from all those organisations mentioned above had worked tirelessly with the support of Sport New Zealand and its observations and critique have been a major influence on the 2021-24 FPS Strategic Plan which was signed off by the board in August 2021.

The resulting Funding Agreement between FPS and HCC has in short saved FPS to such an extent that during the August 2021 Covid-19 lockdown the organisation was able to remain viable without having to look towards Council for additional financial support.

The additional support from HCC has brought the two organisations much closer together through hearts and minds and we acknowledge the awesome sense of teamwork and practical advice and support provided by the HCC team led by Marcus Sherwood.

The end of the financial year also saw a change in ownership of FPS with HCC taking over from CFT as our landlords. Throughout the challenges of the 2019-20 and 2020-21 year CFT have remained staunch supporters of the Sportsville concept and of FPS and without the proactive help of Chairman John Strahl and the trustees of CFT our current position would not look so promising. Thanks John.

The additional financial support from HCC out to the 2023-24 year has indeed given the board confidence to move forward and to strongly focus on its governance duties rather than the previous firefighting mode. Our board have worked hard to follow a good practice governance model, with an Annual workplan that sets out all that we are looking to achieve.

During the year we welcomed Lower Hutt local Caleb Meade to the board as Treasurer/Finance Director via a recommendation from Chartered Accountants BDO and he has set about improving the financial reporting systems to the board. We have also established new board sub-committees which are bolstered by external expert co-options, with health and safety expert and former board member Jason Stapp joining the Audit and Risk Committee, chaired by Caleb and (most recently) Human Resource Management professional Lorraine Kilpatrick co-opted onto our People and Capability Committee, chaired by Sarah Boyes. We have also stood up the Member Clubs Committee co-chaired by club representatives on the board Peter Hegerty and Phil Steere.

This new committee will focus on the more strategic relationships with our member clubs rather than operational matters. The board have also worked to clarify its relationship with FPS Ltd, the entity which oversees the commercial operations of the facility.

As mentioned above FPS developed its 2021-24 strategic plan during the year following a series of weekend workshops and this has helped us the find our North Star and clarify exactly why we exist.

In closing I acknowledge the FPS Board. We have a unique blend of skills and experience that have added tremendous value to the organisation during the year and whose commitment has been unwavering in progressing the organisation on its positive trajectory. It is testimony to their commitment that all board members are continuing in their roles.

Saving the best to last this is also an opportunity to acknowledge and thank our incredibly dedicated and passionate staff at FPS. We have such a small staff but they have made up for it with big hearts and a willingness to go the extra mile each day to ensure that FPS provides quality experiences for all that use it. Patronage of this great facility continues to grow with record monthly numbers now entering the Ricoh Sports Centre and despite the challenges of Covid- 19 Liz and her team continue to go about their work with utmost positivity and commitment.
